### Headlines

The Royal School community was privileged to host a visit from our Patron, HRH Prince, Edward Duke of Edinburgh and HRH Sophie, Duchess of Edinburgh on Tuesday 2 May. The Duke of Edinburgh takes an active interest in the school, particularly in our recent growth and development and was keen to see for himself how the community has blossomed since his last visit in 2017.

Their Royal Highnesses arrived by car to be greeted by Deputy Lord Lieutenant, Ms Christine Arthur and Asa Temple-Purcell, senior pupil Combined Cadet Force Officer. Following the traditional signing of the visitors' book in Queen Victoria Hall, they were introduced to governors, guests, senior members of staff, past and present and prefects.

Mrs Kathy Jefferson escorted HRH Duchess of Edinburgh to the Royal Primary School where she was greeted enthusiastically by all 630 children and staff. Her Royal Highness took the opportunity to see learning in the Reception classroom and participated in a number of Coronation themed activities including sewing King's bunting and painting a commemorative plate whilst being serenaded by the Primary School choir. Pupils also gained an insight into what she plans to wear for the coronation and details of the procession and carriage.

HRH Duke of Edinburgh toured the senior school with Principal Mark Heywood and met a number of pupils in our Wellbeing Hub where he discussed the 'Loving Classroom' initiative that the school is involved in to develop further positive relationships between pupils. In the school theatre he was met by members of the Army and Air Force cadets and inspected the parade of cadets, commenting positively on their drill and dress. On the theme of 'leadership and character development', a critical element of the Royal School educational ethos, HRH Duke of Edinburgh engaged wholeheartedly with cadets from the Police and Nursing cadets and enrichment programme. These are values close to the heart of the Duke along with his long standing patronage of the Duke of Edinburgh award scheme which he heads. A number of senior pupils talked with him about their experience and progress through these awards whilst inviting him to sample some of their prepared camp food. Wisely perhaps he chose to encourage the cooks to taste their own food!

Moving forward he visited the Lichfield boarding house and met with young people from our boarding community who had arrived by different means. HRH Duke of Edinburgh was impressed by the variety of countries that pupils originate from and that some arrive as result of difficult circumstances in their home region, where the school plays an ever more significant part in their development and progress. He met too with a number of our elite swimmer boarders, hearing tales of their incredible commitment to a hectic and structured schedule in order to achieve the success at the highest level.

Pupils, staff and visitors commented on the warmth and wonderful way that Their Royal Highnesses put everyone they spoke with at ease and took a serious interest in them as individuals. The programme extended past the scheduled departure time as nearly every pupil and staff member was spoken to and asked questions about their future plans and interests.

We have been privileged to host HRH Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh and our pupils and friends of the school hugely enjoyed the opportunity to engage with members of the Royal Family in such an auspicious week of the Coronation of King Charles III. As the week comes to a close, we celebrate ourselves in our PTA Coronation Afternoon Picnic on Friday afternoon.

# School with royal links is ready to mark occasion

Pupils at the Royal School in Wolverhampton have been preparing ahead of the King's Coronation by producing artwork and displays around the school.

Over the past term, staff and pupils have worked hard to produce artwork based around the coronation of the King and Queen Consort on May 6.

Each year group created a magnificent display that has turned the school into a coronation art gallery.

Families have enjoyed viewing the artwork and following the coronation trail, as well as having a picture taken in full robes on the throne.

#### Connection

This wonderful community event is the start of a series of celebrations across the school community, which has had royal patronage since its foundation as an orphanage in the 19th Century.

Jenny Bates, assistant headteacher of the Royal School said: "At the Royal School we have a long connection with the Royal family. Queen Victoria the Queen Mother granted permission to use the royal name, and Prince Edward, Duke of Edinburgh is the patron of the school.

"King Charles actually visited the school in 2014, during his time as Prince of Wales, and so with this long connection, we wanted to make something special to mark this historic event.

"Staff and pupils created a coronation trail that goes through the downstairs of

"Parents have been coming in to view the displays and the feedback has been fantastic, and the children have been very excited to show off their work.

"It has created a real buzz around the school ahead of the coronation, and we will be holding a picnic on the Friday before the King's coronation to celebrate, with several themed teas and games on offer for students and families to enjoy."

Previously, the school has enjoyed visits from Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother, Prince Edward and even the King during his time as Prince of Wales, so staff and children will be enjoying sharing memories of those special occasions as we celebrate with King Charles III.

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
